PART TWO

The training of a parish deacon requires more than academic knowledge. Many valuable skills and expertise can only be acquired by practical experience. There are several things that are required for every candidate for parish ministry, but there is also space for the particular needs and desires of the candidate, the supervising pastor, and the congregation you will be serving.

<u>Additional Required Training for All Candidates</u> (Check the requirements off as you accomplish them.)

Attend a Parish Deacon Table Talk with your supervising pastor

Attend a Parish Deacon retreat

Attend synod assembly as a delegate or visitor at least once during training

Compose prayers of the congregation for at least three worship services (Gail Ramshaw's <u>Intercessions for the Christian People</u> is a helpful resource)

Serve on a congregational committee of your choosing for at least one year

Teach or co-teach a class session or forum discussion at least twice. This may involve a wide selection of types of classes – confirmation, Sunday School, adult Bible study, New Members, and so on –and forum topics

Serve in at least two different types of worship assistance on Sunday mornings (assisting minister, usher, lector, speaker, etc.)

Plan and participate in at least one outreach event or program

<u>Training opportunities selected by the candidate and pastor:</u> There are also many other experiences that are suited to your unique gifts, needs, desires, and goals. Please describe each additional training activity as you complete it, and record something about what you learned from the experience.

Some suggested training activities are 1) Accompany the pastor on visits to the sick and/or homebound, 2) Prepare the table for Eucharist, 3) Keep a spiritual journal for a designated length of time, 4) Spend time on a spiritual retreat, 5) Write an article or column for your congregation's newsletter, 6) Attend a program online or in person that is relevant to your congregation's circumstances and interests (small or large church ministry team development, stewardship, conflict management, and so on).
